Historically, research and clinical practice has accepted that roughly 4 out of 5 of those affected by autism are male but researchers are now recognizing that autism manifests differently among females with implications for both diagnosis and care. The issue of how autism affects women and girls differently has recently been the topic for important research as professionals realize that the needs of girls and women are not being accorded the resources they require.



The conference will feature several panel discussions, including a panel of women with ASD, presenting their perspectives, and a panel of mothers with ASD. In addition, a panel of researchers and clinicians will explore the practical measures needed to better support girls and women with ASD.

July 19 - 20, 2018 - Nanaimo Social Stories with Carol Gray

Carol Gray, Director, Team Social Stories and Social Stories Satellite Schools and Services, Michigan

Social Stories can play an essential role in enhancing communication and bringing down anxiety among individuals with ASD. Over the past two decades, Social Stories, and their innovator, Carol Gray, have earned the respect of parents, professionals, and people with autism, for their utility in providing clear explanations of what is often a confusing social world. This Social Stories 10.2 workshop, led by Carol Gray, will devote two full days to the art and science of Social Stories, with the focus on practicing skills and discussing new strategies.

Learning how to research, develop, and implement a genuine Social Story is critical to their effectiveness, safety, and integrity. While one of the most popular evidence-based instructional strategies for learners with autism, Social Stories are also frequently misused. This workshop will define clearly the criteria for what a Social Story is and how you can develop them to build positive social concepts and skills in an individually tailored, unassuming, and supportive learning context.

Carol Gray is a consultant to children, adolescents, and adults with autism, providing support via workshops and presentations, information, referral, resources, and direct services for individuals with autism, their families, and professionals who work on their behalf.

Carol Gray is best known for the development of Social Stories, a well-respected evidence-based practice used worldwide with people with autism of all ages. She is an internationally sought-after keynote and seminar speaker, and has completed over 1,000 presentations.

- » Outline the philosophy and research-based rationale of every Social Story;
- » Explain how the Social Story goal may be used by any parent or professional to determine what is – and is not – a Social Story;

Michelle Garcia Winner, MA, CCC-SLP-Founder & CEO of Social Thinking

Pamela Crooke, PhD, CCC-SLP – Chief Strategy Officer of Research, and the Director of Social Thinking Training & Speakers Collaborative, Santa Clara, California

Social Thinking methodology teaches individuals with social learning challenges to think about the social world, in order to communicate more effectively. It provides practical frameworks and strategies to help interpret and respond to abstract social information. It is relevant to individuals with autism and/or ADHD,

whose academic performance is in the normal range but who face significant challenges in social understanding.

These provide developmentally appropriate tools to foster social attention and self-regulation for students in kindergarten through middle school. This is an interactive day filled with creative group activities to help our students move from being "Me" thinkers to "We" thinkers. The connection between these lessons and educational/academic standards in the mainstream classroom will be examined to see how they can help improve reading comprehension, written expression, conflict resolution, and working as part of a group.

Non-aversive Strategies to Assist Individuals with Autism and Challenging Behaviours

Andrew McDonnell, PhD, Director, Studio3 Training Systems, U.K.


This day will focus on how to manage behaviours of concern using a low arousal approach,

developed by Dr. McDonnell to help support personnel in schools and group homes manage 'highly aroused' and stressed individuals. The emphasis will be on verbal and nonverbal strategies to de-escalate crisis situations. In addition, the approach involves 'reflective practice' that is, 'What is my own contribution to the situation?

Low-arousal approaches include interaction, diffusion and distraction strategies; coping with challenging behaviours including debriefing – why it is necessary and how to do it, managing versus changing behaviours, physical avoidance skills and physical intervention strategies.

Dr. Andrew McDonnell is a Clinical Psychologist and Director of Studio3 Training Systems, based in the UK. He has a special interest in arousal mechanisms in people with autism and the management of severe challenging behaviours.

Managing the Anxious Symptoms of Children and Adolescents with ASD - Practical Strategies


Judy Reaven, PhD, Associate Professor of Psychiatry and Pediatrics, University of Colorado, Denver

Children and adolescents with ASD are at high risk for developing anxiety symptoms that interfere with functioning at home, school and in the community. Research has shown that they demonstrate significant reductions in anxiety following participation in modified Cognitive Behavior Therapy (CBT) interventions. Facing Your Fears (FYF) is a group CBT intervention for managing anxiety in youth with ASD. Throughout the training, participants will learn about FYF, identify core components of the clinic based FYF program, learn how to modify FYF for teens with ASD and intellectual disabilities, as well as strategies for delivering FYF in school settings. Video examples and interactive small group activities will be presented throughout the training.

Dr. Reaven is Associate Professor of Psychiatry and Pediatrics at the University of Colorado Anschutz Medical Campus and is the Associate

Director of JFK Partners as well as Director of Research for JFK Partners/Developmental Pediatrics. She is the primary developer of Facing Your Fears (FYF), a cognitive behavior therapy group treatment intervention for anxiety symptoms in children with ASD.



November 2, 2018 – Vancouver & Web Streaming **INVESTing in Girls and Women with ASD**

Dori Zener, MSW, RSW, Toronto

Girls and women with ASD largely camouflage their characteristics in an effort to pass as neurotypical. Due to their difficulties reading social cues, girls and women with ASD are disproportionately victims of bullying, sexual assault and abusive relationships. Mental health challenges such anxiety, depression, panic, eating disorders, ADHD, OCD and addictions often come to the attention of professionals before an ASD diagnosis is given, if at all.



- » Assess needs and elicit strengths
- Create a therapeutic environment that validates and fosters resil-
- Teach models for introducing important topics such as personal safety, gender identity, adapting to change
- » Use therapeutic techniques to develop emotional regulation, social skills and greater self care
- Support girls and women as they thrive with new challenges and experiences

Dori Zener, MSW, RSW, is an Individual, Couple and Family Therapist

in Toronto. She has been working with individuals affected by ASD and learning differences for over a decade, with a particular interest

in girls and women. She hosts "Asperfemme," a free support group for women on the spectrum.
